

n January 2021, I shared with our congregation about two things 2020 taught me. First, we cannot make plans for ourselves and be so sure because all our plans in 2020 got derailed because of COVID. There is no guarantee that 2021 will be different. It could even get worse.

Second and more importantly, everything seems to be determined by the pandemic and not God. Our situation is causing confusion, uncertainty, and panic. But for God it isn't. God is with us and He is steadfast, established and secure. In fact, in His sovereignty, God is unfolding His purposes through human frailty and confusion.

GOD IS STEADFAST, AT WORK AND ON TIME

Here we are, six months into 2021 and the situation has gotten worse both in India and Nagaland, but God is still the same: steadfast, at work, and on time. If that is the case, then it is important that we ask what God wants to do in our lives even at such a time?

We often ask: "What does God want to do in my life?" expecting God to move while we wait with expectant hearts. I believe God's answer is, "Sure, I have plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future". But could God be saying something more? Is He rather expecting us to do something first so that He can unfold His plans for us? I believe so.

YOU FIRST

A scripture verse our church received early this year was Hosea 10:12, and this verse is the reason I believe God wants us to do something first so that He can carry out His plans in our lives. The verse is: "Sow for yourselves righteousness, reap the fruit of unfailing love, and break up your unploughed ground, for it is time to seek the Lord, until he comes and shower righteousness on you." And so "break up your unploughed ground" is our theme for 2021.

There are some things in life that God does without our help like in creation or His work of redemption. But there are some things He expects us to do first and cooperate with Him so that He can do what He wants to do in our lives. Hosea 10:12 implies the same.

WHAT DOES THIS MEAN FOR US?

Farmers plough fallow ground to break up blocky soil and weeds and plants are turned into the soil to increase decomposition and add nutrients to the soil. Unless the farmer does this no crop is planted. Similarly, there are areas in our lives that need to be plowed and weeds removed so that God can do His work.

Israel was in the same situation in Hosea's day. As God's covenant people they had tasted the goodness of God in the past. Their forefathers passed on their faith to them yet in Hosea's day wickedness and idolatry was rampant. Yet in God's eyes Israel was ready for cultivation, but it needed to break up its unploughed ground so that God could do His work.

So what could be stopping God's work in our lives? What needs ploughing? Let me point out five (5) things that could stop God's work in our lives by looking at five characters in the Bible who had similar hindrances that was preventing God to work in their lives.

1. BREAK UP THE GROUND OF ANGER

Anger is a hindrance to God's work. Particularly anger towards God. Such anger questions God about unanswered prayers and feels abandoned.

The generation that came after Joshua's neither knew God nor what he had done for Israel. So God raised Judges to lead Israel, and Gideon was one of them.

During Gideon's time the Israelites suffered under the Midianites. They were forced to hide in mountain caves. They could not rear any livestock nor grow any crop because the Midianites came and looted everything. At such a time Gideon was threshing wheat in a winepress to hide the grain from the Midianites. There the angel of the Lord came to him and said, "The Lord is with you, mighty warrior" (Jdg.6:12).

Gideon responded: "If the Lord is with us, why has all this happened to us? Where are all His wonders that our fathers told us about when they said, 'Did not the Lord bring us up out of Egypt?' But now the Lord has abandoned us and put us into the hand of Midian." (Jdg. 6:13). You can almost feel Gideon's anger. What if Gideon had allowed his anger to lead him to disobey when the angel told him: "Go in the strength you have and save Israel from the Midians. I am sending you"? (v.14).

But Gideon broke the ground of anger and obeyed. And because of that he was able to defeat the Midianites (Jdg.7).

2. BREAK UP THE GROUND OF PRIDE

God hates pride as it hinders His work. Prov.16:5 says, "The Lord detests all the proud of heart..."

One of Israel's many neighbours was the nation of Aram. Naaman was the commander of the army of Aram. The scripture describes Naaman as "a great man in the sight of his master and highly regarded, because through him the Lord had given victory to Aram. He was a valiant soldier, but he had leprosy." (2 Kings 5:1)

As Chief of Army Staff, Namaan was highly respected. But he had leprosy and couldn't find a cure. Naaman had an Israelite slave girl who knew about Elisha the prophet in Samaria. So she told her master's wife that the prophet Elisha could cure him. When the wife told Naaman about this he got permission to go to Samaria.

When Naaman arrived at Elisha's house he probably expected Elisha to welcome him and greet him. After all he was a well-known Army Chief. He also probably expected the prophet to do something dramatic and cure him on the spot. But none of that happened. Ironically, Naaman wasn't even invited in. Instead Elisha sent him a message: "Go, wash yourself seven times in the Jordan, and your flesh will be restored and you will be cleansed" (v.10). Being a man of power and authority, of course, his pride and ego were hurt. So much so that he said, "Are not Abana and Pharpar, the rivers in Damascus, better than any of the waters of Israel? Couldn't I wash in them and be cleansed?" So he turned and went off angrily. (v.12)

What if Naaman's story had ended there - allowing his pride to become an obstacle to his healing. But Naaman listened to his servant's request to obey the prophet. So swallowing his pride, he went and dipped himself in Jordan seven times. Thus, Namaan broke the ground of pride and was healed!

3. BREAK UP THE GROUND OF FEAR & DOUBT

Fear is a natural human response. It can be crippling and make our lives unproductive and miserable. It weakens our faith.

When the angel came to Mary & Joseph with the message of God's plan for the Messiah to be born through them, the two teenagers were filled with fear and doubt. When the angel appeared to Mary, she "was greatly troubled..." (Lk.1:29). And when she was told that she would be pregnant through the Holy Spirit and bear a son named Jesus, she answered, "How will this be since I am a virgin!" (v.34)

Joseph too responded in a similar fashion. He and Mary were pledged to be married, but before they came together Mary was already with child through the Holy Spirit. When Joseph came to know this, he was afraid and deeply troubled so he planned to divorce Mary (Mt.1:19).

Both Mary and Joseph were gripped with fear and doubt.

But how did they respond? After the angel explained to Mary how it would all come about, Mary answered, "I am the Lord's servant. May it be to me as you have said (Lk.1:38)

After Joseph had decided to divorce Mary, the angel appeared to him in his dream and told him to not be afraid to take Mary as his wife. Joseph woke up and "did what the angel of the Lord commanded him and took Mary home as his wife" (Mt.1:24)

Because these two teenagers yielded to the plan of God, in spite of their fears and doubts, God used them to usher in the Saviour of the world.

4. BREAK UP THE GROUND OF RELIGIOSITY

Religiosity looks like this: "Having a form of godliness but denying its power" (2 Tim.3:5)


The Pharisees of Jesus' day fit the bill. That's why Jesus called them hypocrites, doomed, brood of vipers, white washed tombs, etc. They occupied respectable positions in society but their religiosity became a huge hindrance to the work of God in their lives. Instead of leading people to freedom, they were enslaving people in legalism.

Nicodemus was one of them. He appears three times in the gospel of John.

Leaving aside his status, he came to Jesus one night looking for answers (Jn.3:1,2). When he didn't understand Jesus telling him that no one can see the Kingdom of God unless he is born again, Jesus helped him understand.

On another occasion, when the Pharisees were trying to find fault with Jesus, Nicodemus brought up the law in Jesus' defense (Jn.7:50).

Finally, after Jesus died, Nicodemus accompanied Joseph of Arimathea in performing the final burial rites for Jesus (Jn.19:39). This was an extraordinary action by a Pharisee. Nicodemus broke the barrier of religiosity to become a bold and committed follower of Jesus.



5. BREAK UP THE GROUND OF EVADING JESUS

The gospel of John ends with the moving incident where Peter is reinstated by the risen Christ by the Sea of Galilee. Peter had blatantly denied Jesus the night Jesus was arrested (Jn.18:12ff). That incident ended with the cock crowing and Peter, remembering Jesus' words, wept bitterly. This probably was the darkest moment in Peter's life. Next, we see Peter on Easter morning where he goes to the empty tomb (Jn.20:3-9). His denial of Jesus a few days earlier must have been haunting him all along. Now that Jesus had risen Peter must have been all the more aware of his mistake – something he knew he couldn't run away from. Yet he pretended as though everything was normal.



So one evening, after Jesus' resurrection, in a very business-as-usual kind of disposition Peter says, "I am going out to fish" (Jn.21:3). Though Peter and his friends were seasoned fishermen, their fishing adventure that night was a total failure. I wonder why this team of fishing pros could not catch anything? Was it because of Peter? Was Peter's announcement to go fishing an evasion to hide what was going on in his heart? Did Jesus orchestrate their misadventure that night so that He could get Peter's attention to help him stop evading his reality? I believe so, because early the next morning they made a huge catch following Jesus' instruction to throw their net on the other side, and Jesus used this miraculous catch to get Peter's attention and resolve his issue of evading his Saviour. The third time Jesus asked Peter: "Do you love me?" Peter answered, "Lord, you know all things; you know that I love you." (Jn.21:17). This was the moment that lifted Peter out of that dark experience which caused him to evade Jesus. And what followed was the unfolding of what Jesus had already promised Peter in Mt.16:18, "I tell you that you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of Hades will not overcome it".

Just as God wanted to do His work in Gideon, Namaan, Mary and Joseph, Nicodemus, and Peter's lives, He wants to do His work in us too today. But also, as much as these people needed to break their ground first for God to do His work, we also need to break ours first. What ground needs to be ploughed in your life? What if we are just one plough away from setting off God's plan and purpose in our lives which we have been longing for? So let's get to work, for the harvest is sure.

Emotional Absence A Challenge to Family Life Khrieno L. Sakhrie

What is emotional absence?

Emotional absence is the absence of connection with other people on an emotional level.

People who are emotionally absent may show it as:

- difficulty being loving or affectionate with a family member
- · reduced ability to express emotion
- difficulty empathizing with another person's feelings
- not easily sharing emotions or feelings

Every person, as he or she grows, takes on many roles in this journey called life. And specific to me, among others, I am a parent, a teacher, a wife and a family - roles which I believe are pretty much on the top of the list. It is in looking through these roles that I discuss our topic.



[As a parent]

AAP:

Author William Martin once said, "You do not have to make your children into wonderful people. You just have to remind them that they are wonderful people. If you do this consistently from the day they are born, they will believe it easily."

Parents play an important role in the upbringing of an individual and it is important for both the parents to make sure they give their best to the child.

Emotional absence parenting - which obviously carries negative connotations - is a style of parenting where parents don't respond to their child's needs or desires beyond the basics of food, clothing, and shelter.

A child, since birth, needs good nutrition, love, care and a healthy atmosphere. And of course, both the parents. This is where the problem starts when the parents put their responsibilities to each other and try to get rid of them.

For example, Mother tries to put the financial responsibility to the father and Father tries to put emotional care responsibility to the mother. They forget that the child needs both of them. Especially, emotional care; love and affection of both the parents are important and necessary.

If the child is deprived of this from any one of the parents, it leaves a very negative impact on him. If a father is emotionally distant/absent, the son might start feeling unwanted. The lack of involvement from the father leaves the child disappointed and with unmet desires. This eventually leaves in the underdevelopment of a child's emotions.

[As a teacher]

AAT:

Students' indiscipline is a problem that has become common in most schools. However, discipline of schools of students is not an aspect of the school systems alone. Parents have a role to play in shaping behaviour of children through the process of nurturing. However, many parents remain emotionally absent from their children as they engage in other activities.

I have seen many children with emotionally or even physically absent parents who miss out on many of their children's school activities. In more cases than I would like, parents have shown an almost complete lack of interest in their child's school work like failing to sign

their school calendar or progress tests (showing that they are not paying attention to their progress or lack of) or consistently missing Parent-Teacher meetings or giving no reason for their child's absence from school, to name a few. It is heartbreaking to see the embarrassment of some students when they have to stand in for their parents or make excuses for them.

Children should experience a warm, intimate and continuous relationship with their parents, in whom both find satisfaction and enjoyment, and that, not to do so, for many children manifest significant mental health challenges later in life. The implication is that emotional presence of parents at childhood stage provides the basis for secure development that could manifest in a well-disciplined adolescent. To the contrary, emotional absence of a parent at childhood stage and at adolescence could breed an undisciplined child. Parental presence therefore is significant in helping the child to grow trusting in the self and in others; being confident and viewing the world positively.

[As a wife] AAW:

Study after study confirms that the quality of the relationship between parents, that is, the way they show their love for each other, impacts children's development and their self-concept. One of these studies published in the Journal of Family Issues confirms previous findings that parents who have an affectionate, positive relationship with their spouse engage in more positive parenting activities-such as singing, reading and playing with their children. This is referred to as the "spill over" effect. When your relationship with your spouse is "high or low," the quality of this relationship "spills over" to how your child is parented. If you feel loved and supported, for example, you might have more patience to kneel down with your child and work on his Lego building with him. If your thoughts are taken up by the ongoing distress you have with your spouse, your irritability may spill over to your child. Instead of playing Legos with him, you yell at him for making a mess in the living room with all of his Lego bricks. Parents should pay close attention to these findings.

[As a family] AAF:

So there's nothing like family. The people we're related to by blood and marriage are expected to be our closest allies, our greatest sources of love and support. Family is where our first and strongest emotional memories are made. But with this emotional absence, family contact becomes a burden, because no one is comfortable spending that much time with a stranger. If you want your

family members to know and accept each other lovingly, you have to begin with your own emotional honesty and openness

An Emotionally absent family does not like to talk about feelings, as the subject makes them uncomfortable. They prefer to talk about events and facts. If they are forced to discuss their emotions, they will switch to another topic of conversation as soon as possible. This can leave you feeling uncared for or

It may be noted that Emotional intelligence (EQ): the capacity to be aware of, control, and express one's emotions, and to handle interpersonal relationships judiciously and empathetically, is incredibly powerful in keeping the family healthy because it puts you in control of your relationships with parents and children, siblings and extended family.

CONCLUSION:

How do you establish and maintain a healthy family? It is impossible to do that with our own knowledge and understanding. We need our manual, the Bible.

Psalms 144:12 says, "May our sons in their youth be like plants full grown, our daughters like corner pillars cut for the structure of a palace."

Like the psalmist wishes, may our sons be as plants, flourishing and promising much fruit; so they might be of healthful constitutions, well educated in all useful knowledge, natural and religious, and grow both in wisdom and stature, and appear to be of promising parts for usefulness in the church and state; and especially that they might be the plants of the Lord, pleasant ones to him, and profitable to others.

And daughters as "corner pillars", which support the house, finely graved and beautifully carved like the pillars which hold up the palace, be adorned with grace and good works, particularly with modesty, meekness, and humility.





Break up the Fallow Ground

have been asked to share a few things based on my profession as a government servant and, while pondering on the theme, I have been persistently led to share on another issue that has been affecting humankind all over the world. But before that, let us revisit Jeremiah 4:3 and summarize it to make my sharing easier to understand.

The fallow land in the passage must be metaphorically comparing the receptivity of the human heart to God's guidance and for us to sow seed as Jesus taught in one of his parables later. God is asking us to break our hearts and allow Him to work in us and through us. Yet, even as professed Christians, many of us have failed to do that, or are yet to get there. Thus, many of us can be referred to as the fallow land while even more have allowed the seeds to be thrown amongst the thorns – our worldly wants, desires and other wrongful and arbitrary thoughts and actions – thereby not yielding the fruits God desires of us.

Coming to the present day and the pandemic that has gripped the world, we admit that, yes, God has allowed this to happen. However, I firmly believe He has not allowed this to punish humankind for all its sins. I firmly believe that Jesus has already paid the price on our behalf and that account has been settled even for today, this very moment. Nonetheless, we continue to hear certain prayer warriors on social media who condemn the government for its corruption and wrong policies, condemn the people for falling and for not praying hard enough, and condemn the churches for not opening their doors. We hear of Nagaland being kept safe till now only because of the incessant prayers of these warriors. What they seem to have forgotten is that the virus is everywhere affecting even the most devoted and godly men in all parts of the world. They seem to have forgotten that Jesus has also paid the price for those who have been infected or breathed their last because of the virus. God has given commands throughout the Bible. But we tend to misinterpret His Words. Romans 13:1-2 decisively says, "Let every soul be subject to the governing authorities. For there is no authority except from God, and the authorities that exist are appointed by God. Therefore whoever resists the authority resists the ordinance of God, and those who resist will bring judgment on themselves". Therefore, the doors of the churches in Nagaland are closed at this time because the authorities of the land have ordered it so.

I certainly do not mean or desire to deride or belittle anyone's beliefs and revelations, but what's black is black and what's white is white. There is no grey area for God or for His people. But because we are human, because we are still fallow, and because we are still yet to be broken up, we allow our minds to be filled with what may have not come from God. As a consequence, we sow bad seeds and make others feast on rotting fruits.

At this difficult time, we must not only pray for safety; we must also pray for discernment and to help us cultivate and reorient our hearts, minds and ears towards God more than ever before. As Christians, we must make the best use of the worst of times and turn our fallow lands to fertile grounds so that we may bear good fruits to share with one another. Our God is already at work bringing people closer globally as one against a common enemy, steering better equipped nations to help other nations physically, financially and materially.

Back home too, we have seen and heard of health workers and frontliners literally risking and sacrificing their lives so that we are safe. And even closer, in our own homes, we have more time for the family, more time to do things together, worship together, keeping prayer chains together, discovering and putting our latent talents to good use — the list goes on. We are grateful and proclaim our thankfulness to Him.

Lastly, continue to fervently pray for divine guidance and knowledge for our government(s) so that they may be able to put in place effective policies and action plans to tackle the prevailing situation; divine guidance and knowledge for scientists and virologists over the world so that they may find the right vaccines and medicines to cure those affected and to prevent its spread. If God has allowed the pandemic, He surely will provide a way to end it too. He is the Driver and is Always at the Helm of every situation.



MINISTERING TO SECULAR MINDS IN A CHRISTIAN TOWN

The first thing that usually comes to a Christian mind when we hear the word secular is, it is not Christian, or it is something that is outside the church. The idea stands true to the definition, but as a Christian we don't really have an option to ignore the secular world at its own mercy.

How do we minister to the mind whose ideology is to be free from any religious or spiritual connections, rules and principles?

In a Christian state like ours, we need to ask what is feeding the secular minds that they would rather opt for it. Is the church losing its influence on the people or is the church not addressing enough to the secular minds?

People are becoming increasingly secular in their thinking, and many view church or other religious activities unnecessary. Even for many young Nagas who are born and brought up in a Christian setting, the church and the activities of the church bores them. They would rather be out there hanging out with friends, go out fishing or hiking than to be in the church. Few who come to church are occupied with their gadget or standing outside the church sun bathing and having spicy gossips. There is hardly any fear of the Lord or reverence for Him, we have become casual Christians and though this sounds better than being secular it is still an issue that needs to be addressed because the question is, "why are we doing what we are doing?"

In my short time of ministering to young people I had the privilege to know a handful of them who are totally ignorant of the Gospel, and even the most popular Bible stories like that of David, Caleb, Joshua and Moses. They knew more about, music, movies and dramas, fashion, car, gadgets and celebrities than their Sunday school Bible stories. The reason was, they grew up not at homes but from the hostel where there were no church or Christian activities. As they grew older, I can understand why they have no interest in God or church activities even though they acknowledge the existence of God.

The other issue is that the things of the world sound more fun and looks much glittery than the Bible studies or the prayer meetings. One need not be so determined or drag their feet to go to a party, get drunk and sleep around, and the best way to live this lifestyle is to ignore or deny the Holy God that forbids a sinful lifestyle.

I don't pretend to have all the solution for reaching out and ministering to the secular minds but I share this with the limited experiences I had in my time in ministry.

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Pray: we can be tempted to depend in our own experience and knowledge to minister to people but nothing spiritual is fruitful without praying.

Build relationships: I don't believe there is anything easier to speak the truth to anyone than to our closest friends. Relationship takes time, energy and commitment but the better we get to know someone the easier it is to communicate.

Don't throw the gospel bomb on the first meet. We must be good at discerning the spirit or it might actually do bad than any good for people who had nothing to do with God or the Church.

Get to know the root of their behavior: people believe in something because they are fed with those teachings. People also react to certain things because of their experience with things that happened around them. Nobody becomes an addict, an atheist or a stone hearted alcoholic overnight. There is always a story behind people becoming what they became. Hear them out, get to know the root of their behavior and help them. I like how Jesus ministered with the Samaritan woman at the well, He did not beat around the bush, He went straight to the issue and addressed it. He did the same with the rich ruler who was unwilling to sell all he had to follow Him.

Be relatable: Apostle Paul in one of his missionary journeys he found that the people of Athens have erected a pillar to an Unknown god. Paul used that pillar to relate to the men of Athens to introduce Jesus. When we are able to find a common ground, people tend to be more open and give their attention.

We must understand that we cannot change lives, but God can. Therefore, we don't go around forcing people accept the Gospel and be transformed. We are just the messengers; God will do the work and also it takes the person's decision to accept and his determination to change.

Be patient, sometimes people are so ready to change but there are people who might take weeks, months and even years to change. Be patient and wait on the Lord.

Finally, do all these in love. Do not be indifferent to people because their beliefs and opinions are different than yours. So many times, it is our expression love for them that will change them rather than the profound, deep and intellectual thoughts that we share.

I am sure there are more than these things that I have shared. I hope and pray that as we go out in the any sphere of influence that God has placed us we will be able to make a ripple of impact to bring about change in the minds of the people we work with. God bless you!

GREETINGS to all in the name of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ! It is my privilege to once again update the Church on our activities in the past year and also share some of our hopes and plans for the future.

With Mr. Tekaba Ao taking voluntary retirement after 22 years of service as Headmaster and Mr. Kedoroko Casavi taking his stead, 2020 saw the end of a chapter in the journey of our School and the beginning of a new one. Under the leadership of our new Headmaster, classes began on January 22 with an enrolment of 450 students. After few weeks of classes, we went in for Sports Week which was held from February 24 to 27. Recognising the importance of sports, the school invested in the purchase of new equipment for the event which proved to be a huge encouragement for our students. Along with that, our teachers and senior students went the extra mile to beautify our playground to make it a wholesome experience for everyone involved. The Sports Week was a grand success for which we give thanks to our Almighty God.

The Parent – Teacher meeting was held on March 7, where our Headmaster and teachers got to interact with parents and discuss various concerns for the betterment of the School. On March 14, we conducted our Faculty Development Programme, with Prof. Buno Liegise as the main Speaker, and two of her colleagues from Nagaland University taking one session each as well. We are grateful to God for providing us highly qualified resource persons, not only last year but even in the past years, who sacrifice their valuable time and resources to help equip our teachers further.

Shortly after the Faculty Development Programme, on March 17, our School along with the rest of the country had to close down on account of the pandemic. Like many other Schools in our State, especially those in rural areas, we were placed in a predicament that we were not prepared for in the slightest. How do we conduct online classes when the vast majority of our students or their parents do not own smart phones? And how do we pay our staff salaries when fees have stopped coming in? These two questions weighted down on us instantly, and as always we turned to our Church for assistance in our time of need.

At a time when many teachers all over the State were receiving only half their monthly salary or in some cases nothing at all, our Church made sure the School was able to pay the salaries of its staff in full every month. We remain ever grateful to our church for the assistance during these challenging times. The School was further blessed with donations from individual members and families, which enabled us to provide hard copy notes to all our students for the duration of the lock down. This was a huge boost for the School and the students, and solved our problem with online classes to a large extend. We are unable to mention the names of all those who helped us, but it is our prayer that God Almighty would bless you all abundantly and use you for His Glory even in the days to come.



By October we were able to resume physical classes for 9 and 10, while the rest had to continue their studies from home. Final exams for classes 8 and below were conducted in November, while selection exams for classes 9 and 10 were held during the first week of December. A total of 45 students were able to appear their HSLC exams this year in the month of April 2021. Looking back, we are humbled by God's grace upon the School, and are reminded once again that we indeed serve a Mighty God who supplies all our needs according to His riches in Glory in Jesus Christ.

Coming to our hopes and plans for the future, allow me to highlight a few. Over the years, the need to upgrade our School to include the Higher Secondary section, and the many requests from parents of this area for the same has been a recurring topic of discussion in our Managing Board meetings. As such, under the direction of the Managing Board, the School Administration is committed to work towards fulfilling the criteria laid down by the NBSE for upgradation by 2025. Along with this, we hope to continue to encourage our students in the field of Sports by providing better facilities, equipment and coaching in the days to come. Not only can sports be a means of keeping young people engaged and away from harmful lifestyles, we believe it can also be a good avenue for ministry and building character as well. Last but not the least, as our School steps into its 30th year we continue to hope and pray for new classrooms for the lower section.

In conclusion, I would like to thank you all, our members, for your support and prayers which have been a constant source of strength and blessing to us. I also thank our leaders and elders for their encouragement, graciousness and patience despite our many failings. As we move forward, we are always reminded of the contributions of those who came before us, many of whom are not with us today. Their dedication and sacrifice continue to challenge us to be better. May God Almighty continue to bless our Church and use us as instruments for His Glory.
